Plant Identification Workshop Praeger Centre, National Botanic Gardens

Morning Session

Books on the Irish Landscape - Charles Shier

A review of books that describe the formative elements of the Irish landscape and how man has impacted upon it, including early structures, the great houses, gardens and demesnes, and how it has been recorded.

Hypericum - Margaret Norton

The genus *Hypericum* includes many native species and a number of garden escapes. In addition, recent studies have disclosed the presence of possible hybridity between two native species - *Hypericum perforatum* and *H. maculatum*.

Some Interesting plants from Co. Louth - Ciarán Flynn

In recent years Ciarán, the joint BSBI Vice-county recorder for Co. Louth, has been recording the flora of the county and in particular the flora and habitats of the Cooley Peninsula.

Brachypodium grasses – David Nash

Three species of this genus are known in Ireland – *B. sylvaticum, B. pinnatum and B. rupestre*. The latter has been recently confirmed from County Dublin. Please bring along specimens especially "*B. pinnatum*".

Afternoon Session

Roses - Declan Doogue

Recent taxonomic revisions and clarifications have required closer consideration of the species-complex formerly known as *Rosa canina*. We will also explore some aspects of the Downy and Sweet-briar roses. Members may wish to bring in *Rosa* material collected in September/October for discussion and consideration.

Rosa literature. Many taxonomic reviews of the genus *Rosa* have taken place, producing, *inter alia*, a wide body of specialised and illustrated literature. Some published examples from the 19th and 20th century will be exhibited

Saturday 19th October 2024

Belmont Demesne, Co. Wicklow Risk Level 1/2

Belmont House (now in ruins) was built in the late 18th century and the estate reverted to the Brabazon family in 1841. The estate and farm are managed by the family. We will walk on a looped trail through the woodland area and observe autumn plants and foliage. If time and weather permits, we may follow the track towards the base of the Little Sugarloaf and explore the heathland there.

- Leader: Sunniva Hanley
- Meet: at the Demesne Car Park; (or 10.30 for tea/coffee at the adjacent bike cabin and coffee hut). There is a €3 parking charge for cars card or coins accepted.
- **Bring:** Field lens, ID books, lunch, warm drink, waterproof clothes and sturdy boots are advised.
- **Directions:** By Car Take the N11 south and exit at Junction 7 (Bray South/Greystones North). At the roundabout turn right onto the R768 for Greystones and follow the signs for Kilruddery House. Go past the entrance to Kilruddery (on your right) and at the next roundabout turn right onto the R761 for Greystones. Continue uphill past Bray Golf Club and at the crest you will see a bus shelter on your right. After the shelter turn right into Templecarrig Lower Road (L1028) and continue for 600 m. Belmont Demesne is on your right. Demesne Eircode A63 FX34. https://maps.app.goo.gl/gFwA7Qd7k99JqoVp7

By Public Transport – Take the DART to Bray then take the 84 bus (direction Newcastle) to stop 4211 on the Rathdown Road, or the 184 bus (direction Newtownmountkennedy) to the same stop. Then walk down the L1028 Templecarrig Lower Road to the entrance and along the estate road to the car park and bike cabin, about 1 km.

Saturday 26th October 2024

Autumnal Colour Tree Walk in St. Anne's Park, Dublin - Risk Level 1

St. Anne's, covering 240 acres, is the second largest park in Dublin. It was formerly the home of Sir Arthur Edward Guinness who laid out the gardens and completed the main structural planting in the latter part of the 19th century. The Millennium Arboretum was added a century later. We will complete a looped walk examining some of the main coniferous and broadleaved trees in the central area of the park.

- **Bring:** Identification books and hand lens, lunch, walking boots and raingear if the weather forecast suggests rain.
- **Directions:** From the city centre, take the Clontarf Road (R807) north along the coast. Turn left into Mount Prospect Avenue and the entrance to the car park at the Red Stables is the first on the right. If the car park is full, additional parking is usually available along Mount Prospect Avenue.

'The Orchids of North Bull Island' - Philip Grant

Philip will give an overview of the orchid species that occur on Bull Island with a particular focus on the complex population dynamics of the island's Marsh orchids (*Dactylorhiza* species).

The outing will examine the beautiful Museum Building at Trinity College, in which a wide range of stone types was used in its construction, and then the group will visit the Geological Museum located a 15 minute walk away where some geological treasures can be viewed.

Plant Identification Workshop Praeger Centre, National Botanic Gardens

Morning Session

Witches' Broom in Conifers – Charles Shier

A presentation that will examine the causes and occurrence of Witches' Broom in conifers and its importance to the horticultural trade.

Identifying Lianas from the East Asian region - Zhuzan Xirao

Over the past few centuries, various species of lianas or twining vines originating from East Asia have been introduced to Ireland as ornamental plants, including Wisteria, Clematis and Honeysuckle. This presentation will explore the distinguishing characteristics of some of these groups.

Book Review – Rosaleen Fitzgerald

"The Invention of Nature: The adventures of Alexander Von Humbold - the lost hero of science" by Andrea Wulf, will be introduced and reviewed by Rosaleen.

Juncus - Declan Doogue

Many of our native rushes (*Juncus*) display significant ecological preferences and strong habitat/community allegiance. Preserved examples of most of the Irish species will be exhibited.

Afternoon Session

Rubus fruticosus agg. The Brambles. - DNFC members

Various DNFC members have made significant gatherings of *Rubus* material from different parts of Ireland. We will begin to examine extracts from this body of herbarium specimens, mainly determined by the late David Allen, in order to assign the preserved specimens to their respective taxonomic groups ("Series").

We will also be introduced to part of the large body of taxonomic literature relating to the *Rubus fruticosus* complex. Additionally, participants are referred to the website prepared by John Norton (entitled 'Brambles of the British Isles', by John Norton), which has excellent photographs of many of the *Rubus* species from Hampshire, where David Allen studied the *Rubus* flora for many years, as well as images from other areas.

'Semi-natural Grasslands in Ireland' - Maria Long

Maria is an ecologist with the National Parks and Wildlife Service who specialises in grassland habitiats. Her presentation will cover some of the semi-natural grasslands that can be found in Ireland.

St. Stephen's Day Walk on South Bull Wall Risk Level 1
