Saturday 4th October 2025

BSBI Autumn Meeting, NBG

The Botanical Society of Britain and Ireland (BSBI) will hold its Irish Autumn Meeting and AGM 2025 at the National Botanic Gardens, Glasnevin, commencing at 10.00 AM. The topics discussed will include: the current botanical research from the Herbarium; a workshop on *Erigeron* species; turlough ecology; and the development of the IVC habitat classification system. 'The Flora (Protection) Order 2022'

Pat will describe some of the vascular plant species listed in the Flora (Protection) Order 2022, giving us an overview of what the plants look like and describing where they may be found. This new list of plants protected in Ireland supersedes previous orders made in 1980, 1987, 1999 and 2015.

Saturday 1st November 2025

Plant Identification Workshop National Botanic Gardens, Glasnevin

Identification of species in the genus *Hypericum* - Margaret Norton

Bryophytes of Slieve Gullion, Co. Armagh, history and vegetation -. Ciaran Flynn

Following on from the Member's Day talk, we will look at the bryophytes of Slieve Gullion in greater detail. Historical recording, vegetation, and geological influences will all be discussed.

Book Review and discussion - Charles Shier

"The Tree Hunters: How the Cult of the Arboretum Transformed Our Landscape" by Thomas Pakenham, the historian, author and custodian of Tullynally Castle. His book discusses the start of a trend for country gentlemen to collect specimen trees for their demesnes; introduces us to some of the characters who travelled to far-flung lands to search for new species; describes the rise of a number of famous nurseries; and provides an overview of the development of some parks and arboreta still visited today.

Rubus - Alexis Fitzgerald

Revision of the bramble species recorded during the summer visits by the *Rubus* expert David Earl, including a review of photographic materials collected during the visits. Members should bring their copies of *"Brambles of Scotland"* by Angus Hannah, BSBI Handbook No.25 as well as the earlier work "*Brambles of the British Isles*" by E. S. Edees and A. Newton.

Saturday 8th November 2025 Autumn Colour – Tree Walk in Phoenix Park Risk Level 1

Set in the northern sector of the Phoenix Park, **Ashtown Castle** has had a varied history. It has served as a residence for the keepers of the deer; the Under Secretary for Ireland; the first US ambassador and the Papal Nuncio. We will visit the adjacent walled garden and the small arboretum beside the castle and complete a looped walk to examine some of the main coniferous and broadleaved trees in the northern area of the park. The walk should take about 1.5 to 2 hours.

Bring: Identification books and hand lens, walking boots and raingear if the weather forecast suggests rain.

Directions: From the city centre, take the Chapelizod Road (R109) and turn right into Chesterfield Avenue. Continue up as far as the Phoenix Monument roundabout and veer right onto Nunciature Road, which leads to the Car Park at the Visitor Centre. { GPS: 53.36479, -6.33200 }

Tuesday 18th November 2025

'The Native Woodland Trust' - Jim Lawlor, Chairperson of Trust

Very little of our ancient woodland still remains in Ireland today. The Native Woodland Trust was formed to halt the destruction of Ireland's woodlands and to help native woodland to regenerate and expand naturally. Jim will tell us about the formation of the Trust and describe its objectives; discuss its record of acquiring, expanding and managing woodlands; and outline the Trust's plans for the future.

Saturday 22nd November 2025

Bird Outing – Rogerstown Estuary Risk Level 1

On the outing, we would hope to see a variety of ducks (Wigeon, Shoveler, Teal, Pintail) and waders (Redshank, Greenshank, Godwits, Curlew, etc) as well as Brent Geese. The walk to the estuary from the car park goes through the Turvey Nature Reserve with woodland, hedgerows and ponds, with opportunities to seer different birds.

Bring: Binoculars or viewing scopes, warm clothes and wear strong footwear/

wellingtons; packed lunch optional.

Directions: From the M50, take the M1 north and exit at Junction 4. On the exit ramp,

keep to either of the two right lanes to take the R132 north to Skerries/ Rush. Cross over the M1 and at the 2nd roundabout continue straight ahead onto the R132 for Skerries. At the next small roundabout (1.3 kms), take the second exit and stay on the R132. At the next small roundabout (300 metres), turn right onto Turvey Avenue (signposted L2136 for Donabate). After one kilometre, the Car Park entrance will be on the left-hand side. There is ample parking. { GPS: 53.49294, -6.18139 }

Plant Identification Workshop Praeger Centre, National Botanic Gardens

The plants and vegetation of Wales, and its relation to the Irish flora - Ciaran Flynn

(Malahide Road). Pass the Hilton Hotel on your left, and after 500 m turn right onto the R123 (Balgriffin Road). Turn left at the T-junction at the end onto the

R106 (Coast Road) and continue on this until you reach Portmarnock.

'The Irish Naturalists' Journal 1925-2025: a century of natural history publishing in Ireland' - Nigel Monaghan, Editor INJ

The *Irish Naturalists' Journal* was established in 1925 as a successor to *The Irish Naturalist* (1892-1924). Throughout its history the INJ has been open to amateur enthusiasts and professionally trained scientists. It has been run for a century on a voluntary basis with members drawn from various sectors of the Irish natural history community. Over 8,800 individual contributions have published within the INJ covers and amongst the 15 occasional publications to date. It was founded by Belfast Natural History and Philosophical Society (BHNPS), Belfast Naturalists' Field Club (BNFC) and Dublin Naturalists' Field Club (DNFC) and was run by a committee representing these and other field clubs in the early years. It is now run by a company, but while the legalities may have changed, the spirit of the committee system remains, in particular the importance of operating on an all-island basis and the encouragement of amateur contributors.

Friday 26th December 2025

St. Stephen's Day Walk at UCD, Belfield Risk Level 1

An opportunity to walk off some of the excesses of Christmas and enjoy a bit of fresh air on the Belfield Campus at University College Dublin.

Bring: Warm clothes, strong footwear, food and a hot drink.

Directions: From the city centre take the R138 for Donnybrook/Stillorgan. After passing

the RTE Mast and Nutley Lane, veer left and take the ramp up to the flyover into UCD. After crossing the flyover you will have to go left. There is usually parking at the Old Running Track off the roundabout or you could double back

and park at N2 beside O'Reilly Hall.

Note: Permit Parking only applies during term time.
